

Admissions & Financial Aid Policies

This Admissions Policy is a U.S. Department of Education requirement for all institutions of higher education. It is designed to ensure that all students must adhere to the U.S. Department of Education's Title IX requirements. - Homeschooling at the secondary level as defined by state law;
- If the college or the Education Secretary has reason to believe that the high school diploma is not valid or was not obtained from an entity that provides secondary school
 - (1) receiving documentation from the secondary school confirming the validity of the diploma, and (2) confirming with the relevant state agency where the secondary school is located that the secondary school is a recognized provider of secondary school education.

4. Have BATTERED IMMIGRANT STATUS

You are designated as a immigrant-qualified if you are a victim of abuse by your citizen or permanent resident spouse, or you are the child of a person designated as such under the Violence Against Women Act.

5. Have a T-VISA

You are eligible if you have a T-visa or a parent with a T-1 visa.

6. **U-Visa holders** are not designated as qualified aliens under the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act (PRWORA), and are therefore not eligible for Title IV, HEA program funds. However, U-Visa holders

If you are interested in attending St. John's College but are in need of accommodations, you should submit the Accommodations Form and schedule an appointment with the Assistant Dean and the Executive Director of Student Life. At this meeting, we will discuss the nature of the reported disability and its impact on learning. We will also discuss the process of receiving reasonable accommodations at St. John's College and the types of accommodations available.

Please bring copies of current documentation of a disability to this meeting. Documentation must be provided by a medical expert within the last three years and include:

- a diagnosis of the disability

- how the diagnosis was determined (what tests were given and the results); and

- A clinical summary, which includes an assessment of how the disability will impact the individual in a college environment and what accommodations are recommended.

Upon completion of the initial meeting, a formal request for the accommodation must be submitted in writing to the school. The school will respond to the request prior to

enrollment. The initial meeting, formal request, and response from the school must take place prior to the pre-enrollment process.

Note: In order to be eligible for Title IV, HEA funding, you must be able to benefit from the reasonable accommodations.
